Building Expansion in North Carolina: By the Ven. Erich Zwingert, SSC

During recent years, the men and women of All Saints Church in Mills River, North Carolina, have undertaken a number of impressive improvements of the parish, who is a building contractor, has agreed to spearhead construction, which will ensure the "personal" touch in making these improvements. The Vestry identified three goals:

Recent examples include the kitchen and fellowship hall renovation, landscape retaining wall replacement, parking lot repaving and striping, and

A capital campaign was launched in February of this year and the

\$275,000 goal was reached in two months. The ceremonial groundbreaking was held on March 4, 2018, and construction began on March 23, 2018. Once the new office space is completed, parish hall

The convergence of several factors led the Vestry to recommend a modest capital campaign to make strategic improvements in the church facility.



renovations will begin. Due to unfortunate weather delays, the roof has not yet been installed on the new office space. The bell tower is nearing completion at the steel fabrication company. Three bells for that tower have been ordered from Meeks & Watson Company and the rock on the front wall will be the last item to be installed. Anticipated

Helping Cancer Patients in Maryland: By the Very Rev'd J. Gordon Anderson

On Saturday May 12th, "Team Saint Alban's" of St. Alban's Church in Joppa, MD, (pictured below) participated in the Amanda Hichkad CCA Celebration Walk in Bel Air, Maryland. This annual walk raises money to support Cancer LifeNet, an organization in Harford County, MD that offers support for cancer patients and their families and friends. St. Alban's Senior Warden, Kristi Sjoholm-Sierchio, herself a cancer survivor, organized the parish team and spearheaded the fundraising. Each person who signs up to walk on a team pays a fee that is donated to Cancer LifeNet, and they can raise additional funds as well. While she would have been happy to raise \$500 and have eight or ten walkers, Team Saint Alban's ended up raising over \$3,000 and having a team of thrity-nine people! Team Saint Alban's was the third largest team walking in terms of size and fundraising! It was amazing to see what God accomplished through our "small but mighty" parish, and network of family and friends! Kristi is currently in the process of organizing a cancer support prayer and ministry group out of the church with other parishioners and friends who are battling various types of cancer.

"Cancer LifeNet, based at the Kaufman Cancer Center at the University of Maryland Upper Chesapeake Medical Center in Bel Air, is a free-of-charge nurse navigation and supportive care program offered to cancer patients and their loved ones in Harford and Cecil counties, regardless of where they receive their cancer treatment. The program provides nurse navigators, volunteer navigators, oncology social workers, support groups and specialized classes, including tai chi, yoga, healthy cooking and group programs for children who have a parent or loved one with cancer. Last year, Cancer LifeNet provided these free-of-charge services to approximately 1,500 cancer patients and family members." (from *The Aegis, June 3, 2017*) &
